

Univertical International's New Partnership Benefits Migrant Students

Univertical International (Suzhou) Inc. is pleased to announce a partnership with the Suzhou Singapore International School (SSIS) Kids4Kids program to provide scholarships to needy students at the Xinxu migrant school. On Saturday, November 26th, 55 migrant students received certificates and receipts covering their 2012 spring semester tuition. During the ceremony, Univertical GM Andy Wilcox and Kids4Kids director Monique Donahue encouraged the students to pursue lifelong joyful learning and opportunities to help others. SSIS Kids4Kids participants also shared the story of the first Thanksgiving. Afterwards, everyone enjoyed a BBQ prepared by Univertical volunteers.



Univertical is committed to the local Suzhou community and has worked with the Xinxu School for more than six years to provide better educational opportunities to disadvantaged migrant children. The partnership began in 2005 with special Saturday English classes organized by Univertical volunteers. The first scholarships were awarded that fall to help the neediest migrant families keep their children in school. Univertical involvement with Xinxu increased in 2008 when the company sponsored the first annual summer Scholars Camp, a week-long English activities camp for middle school students. Univertical has continued to work with Xinxu through 2011, with a summer camp in June and an after school program during the school year.



Suzhou Singapore International School (SSIS) provides an international education to the children of expatriate families. Since 2010, the volunteering group Kids4Kids has dedicated itself to fundraising money to help migrant children in Suzhou. As its name implies, the organization is student planned and run. In addition to scholarships, Kids4Kids has also raised money for an eyeglasses project at the Xinxu School. A local eye hospital gives free eye exams and all students who need glasses receive them.
